ACT CHILDREN'S WEEK 2023 – ANNUAL REPORT (SUMMARY)

In 2023 the **ACT Children's Week Grants Programme** was able to support 121 community-based individuals and organisations to hold their Children's Week-related events / activities. We received Event Reports from 84% of Grant recipients, and participation data indicated engagement with more than 13,660 children and young people, and over 4,069 adults across the ACT. These data are valuable when acquitting funds, and presenting our case to existing and potential sponsors for funding.

A strong emphasis has been on events and activities focussed on STEM, intergenerational engagement (involving seniors, grandparents / friends, young people engaging with younger children), as well as other local-community engagement.

These activities result in considerable community engagement across and within many sectors of our community, resulting in increased connections and social capital - in times of complexity in the community, and when there is a need for communities to come together.

This year we expanded our programme to include the Indigenous sector in Grants and Awards categories. Almost 20% of grant applications specifically referenced Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander or Indigenous themes including on-country excursions, story-telling and cultural activities. Four Award nominations received for Contribution to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Children and Cultural Understanding were presented at Our Awards ceremony on Universal Children's Day. We are hoping this number will grow in the future.

The 2023 **ACT Children's Week Awards Programme** received 45 nominations in total, across the range of categories **AWARD CATEGORIES**:

- Exceptional Young Person
- Youth Commitment
- Community for Children
- Intergenerational Contribution

- Exceptional Senior
- Business Contribution
- Significant Support
- Exceptional STEM Volunteer

Contribution to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander

All nominees received an Award in their nominated categories - either at our Awards Ceremony, or at in-house events. Our committee members were also able to share in some of the latter.

Our Launch and Awards ceremony was attended by several ACT Government Ministers and senior representatives of our seven major partners. The ceremony also included the presentation of an international Supporting Friend of Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) MGA Award to the Children's Week Council of Australia, Region 10 (Australia) - acknowledging ACT Children's Week's "valuable and enduring contributions in the promotion of STEM in the Australian Capital Territory Region".

Once again, the success of the ACT Children's Week's programme very much relies on the continued generosity of our sponsors, the support of our various VIPs and Patrons, and the commitment of our committee of hard-working volunteers. ACT CHILDREN'S WEEK INC – 2023 ANNUAL REPORT

OVERVIEW

2023 was another busy and exciting year for ACT Children's Week.

The role of the ACT Children's Week Committee is to promote involvement in Children's Week by supporting community organisations, groups and individuals who work for the benefit of children and young people in the ACT region.

We provide small seeding grants to encourage and assist organisations to hold events during Children's Week and we promote their work and activities by listing them on our Program of Events - see https://www.actchildrensweek.org.au/events/.

We also provide the opportunity for organisations or individuals to nominate individuals, groups, organisations and children/young people for Children's Week Awards. All those nominated receive an Award Certificate and congratulatory letter during Children's Week. This is a simple, yet powerful way to acknowledge the special work of individuals, groups and organisations who work with and for the children and young people in our community, and to recognise outstanding young people themselves.

A representative selection of award recipients is invited to receive their awards at our Launch and Awards Ceremony held on Universal Children's Day (the last Wednesday in October) during Children's Week.

PARTNERSHIPS

ACT Children's Week very much appreciates the continued financial support of:

- the ACT Government (through the Education Directorate, and the Community Services Directorate, including the Office for Seniors and Veterans),
- the Catholic Education Office (Canberra-Goulburn Archdiocese),
- the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE) ACT Section, and

We also continued our successful partnership with Parentline ACT, who again assisted our volunteer committee with administration and social media.

ACT Children's Week Inc. is a member of the Children's Week Council of Australia which provides national governance and oversight of the state and territory Children's Week organisations.

Our successful partnership continued with the ACT Section of the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE), the world's largest professional association dedicated to advancing technological innovation and excellence for the benefit of humanity. IEEE encourages students to develop their capabilities in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) education and we were delighted with the number of STEM related events held during Children's Week. As part of our partnership, we now have an award category, Exceptional STEM Volunteer which attracted several submissions.

We were delighted to be nominated for, and presented at our Launch and Awards Ceremony with, an international Organizational Supporting Friend of IEEE MGA Award acknowledging ACT CW's promotion of STEM-related events and activities. Our partnership with IEEE is proving to be mutually productive and rewarding and we look forward to it continuing.

Our VIPs also provided inspiring messages - including one from the Governor-General, National Patron of Children's Week, and Dr Anne Aly, federal Minister for Early Childhood Education & Minister for Youth - which can be found on our website: https://www.actchildrensweek.org.au/.

PARTICIPATION DATA

The characteristics of individuals/groups participating in Children's Week are diverse:

- Youth up to 25 years
- Intergenerational including grandparents / Grandfriends / seniors
- Families
- Cultural and linguistically diverse groups
- Schools and other community organisations involved with young people
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander individuals and groups.

Participants come from across the ACT.

GRANTS PROGRAMME - BUILDING SOCIAL CAPITAL

In 2023 the ACT Children's Week Committee offered small seeding Grants (between \$100 - \$150) to assist in organising Children's Week-related events and activities.

The eligible period for events in 2023 was the week prior to Children's Week through to the week after: Monday 14 October – Sunday 3 November.

Criteria for Grant Applications (from our website: https://www.actchildrensweek.org.au/apply-for-a-grant/.

- Grants are only available to organisations based in the ACT.
- Activities must be held within the eligible time period: 14 October 3 November.
- Activities should assist in increasing awareness of the needs, interests, rights and achievements of children and/or young people.
- Activities should promote community involvement and cooperation.
- Activities must not be intended to promote commercial interests.
- Events / activities may fit in to more than one of the categories below, or have a different focus.
- As submitting a report is a requirement of a grant 2023 Grant recipients who did not submit an Event Report are not eligible to apply for a 2024 Grant.

Each year the ACT Children's Week Committee offers small seeding Grants to individuals, groups, schools, and community organisations to assist in organising Children's Week-related activities across the ACT. These activities result in considerable community engagement across and within many sectors of our community, resulting in increased connections and social capital in times of complexity in the community, and when there is a need for communities to come together.

INTERGENERATIONAL ACTIVITIES AND EVENTS

ACT Children's Week encourages applications with a focus on grandparent and intergenerational activities (such as seniors or family members helping with school activities, younger children visiting local aged care homes, etc).

STEM-RELATED ACTIVITIES AND EVENTS

ACT Children's Week is partnered with the **Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE) ACT Section.**

IEEE is an international organisation whose purpose is to promote and support the development of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) among children from a very young age. The ACT Section runs professional development programs, seminars, activities and events for students, young professionals, women in engineering, life members and professionals throughout the year. Their STEM outreach arm promotes STEM in schools and especially among girls.

IEEE provided funding to sponsor Children's Week community- or school-based activities or events which focus on STEM.

INDIGENOUS-THEMED ACTIVITIES AND EVENTS

ACT Children's Week also supports activities and events which support and promote Cultural Integrity in relation to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture, people, and understanding.

Grant recipients are required to provide a brief report on their activity, including attendance numbers, which may be used for promotional purposes. Photographs, if appropriate, are also welcomed.

- **YOUTH COMMITMENT** for groups of children and/or young people who see a need in their community and work together to create a solution.
- **COMMUNITY FOR CHILDREN** for individuals, groups, or volunteers, who have made an outstanding contribution to children and/or young people in the community (may include programs, events, equipment, promotion or management)
- **INTERGENERATIONAL CONTRIBUTION** for older people who have made an outstanding contribution to the wellbeing of children and/or young people **OR** for children and/or young people who have enhanced the lives of older people, including:
 - o **EXCEPTIONAL SENIOR** for a senior who has shown outstanding commitment and generosity to the development of children and/or young people
- **BUSINESS CONTRIBUTION** for businesses who have made extraordinary contributions to children and/or young people.
- **SIGNIFICANT SUPPORT** for individuals, groups, organisations whose contributions significantly improve opportunities for children and/or young people to learn and grow, including:
 - o **EXCEPTIONAL STEM VOLUNTEER AWARD** for an individual/organisation who has made a significant contribution to enriching the skills of science, technology, engineering and mathematics in children and young people.
- This year the Committee introduced an additional Award category CONTRIBUTION TO
 ABORIGINAL AND TORRES STRAIT ISLANDER CHILDREN AWARD for individuals, groups, or
 organisations who have worked to improve outcomes for Indigenous children and young people, or
 who have worked to improve understanding between Indigenous and non-Indigenous groups within
 the community.

In addition, the ACT Children's Week Commissioner chooses someone from the nominations to receive an Exceptional Young Person Award, and the ACT Minister for Seniors and Veterans chooses someone from the nominations to receive an Exceptional Seniors Award.
